

# Internationally Accredited Low-Cost Degree Programmes Taught in English Language at German Universities



## Bachelors, Masters and Doctoral Degrees Taught in English

Some of the most innovative degree programmes offered at German universities are so-called international degree programmes taught in English language. In total 84 Bachelors, 434 Masters and 157 Doctoral programmes are on offer at present (April 2008). As a rule, the above-mentioned programmes share the following characteristics:

### Advantages for the Student

- internationally recognised and accredited degrees
- taught solely or primarily in English, minimum requirement IELTS 6.0 – 7.0
- internationalised curriculum with study periods abroad in some cases
- ties with international guest lecturers and universities
- professional coaching and counselling for international students
- German language is not a requirement but may be required at basic conversational level
- Many programmes are non-fee-paying. Others have exceptionally low tuition fees in international comparison

### How can EURASIA help?

### How to Qualify and Apply

- Since the courses are often oversubscribed students should have first class Bachelors degree (70% upwards)
- Courses taught solely or primarily in English usually require IELTS 6.0 – 7.0
- Apply with all school and university transcripts including legalised copies and legalised translations
- Provide a legalised IELTS certificate - not older than 3 months - from your home country showing your level
